Letter from the Principal

Dear Parents and Guardians:

In a recent publication from Activity, a publication from ACT, an article addressed Common Standards and Assessments. "Many states (including Nevada) have committed to adopting the Common Core State Standards, but numerous questions remain. How should they implement the standards to ensure every high school student graduates ready for college and careers? What will common assessments look like? What does the United States need to do to bring its education system up to the levels of high performing countries?" The Common Core Standards of English Language and Literacy demand that every educator plays a critical role creating highly literate students. The Common Core State Standards for mathematical practice are essential components in developing the mathematical understanding of students. Educators must intentionally provide students opportunities to use the mathematical practices to foster their understanding. Please be assured that the Reed High staff will keep abreast of the most current data of Common Core State Standards, which are currently being implemented in English and Math courses; the other core classes will follow suit. "As states raise academic standards and graduation requirements: The link between strong academic preparation in high school and success in college and careers is clearer than it has ever been. Whether high school graduates go directly to college or into the workplace, they need advanced skills if they are going to be successful (Peltzman, Vranek & Bodary, 2007, p.1). The authors continue: "The primary tool for enhancing the value of a high school diploma is a more inclusive curriculum that includes more credits in core academic subjects and more advanced coursework. How does the

secondary school curriculum affect students' college readiness and opportunity for success? Descriptive studies and statistical analysis reveal a fairly consistent association between higher level coursework, particularly in mathematics and science."

This is why I encourage you during the month of March to sit down with your child when he/she brings home the Reed High School course selection sheet. Please look it over to determine which classes your child will be enrolled in for the 2015-2016 school year. Due to economic concerns, the course catalog is on-line on Reed's Web site rather than in a printed version. Please encourage your child to take Advanced Placement and Honors level courses. Most colleges not only look at Grade Point Averages, but also seriously consider SAT and ACT scores as well as the number of AP and Honors classes on a student's transcript. As you know, the student with the highest GPA (Grade Point Average) will have the value added to Honors and Advanced Placement classes for the purpose of selecting the Valedictorian and Salutatorian. All Honors courses have a value added of .025 and Advanced Placement classes will have the added value of .05.

These are the major categories that the Reed High School community-teachers, students, and parents will work on over the next few years. The administration and faculty will be working on strategies to address many of these issues such as **End of the Course Exams** which will replace the HSPE. We will continue with our HSPE remediation classes for upcoming 12th grade students, the HSPE will end with the class of 2016. We will continue to offer A+ credit **recovery classes** for 9th-12th grade students. We will offer A+ classes

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in ACT to better prepare our students to prepare for college. We have increased our **Advanced Placement** course offerings so that more students including ninth grade students will have an interest in enrolling in AP classes.


First semester report cards were given to the students on **January 13**. If you did not receive your student's report card, please call or drop by the school office for a copy. If your student did not pass his or her classes, please remember that we offer A+ classes after school for credit recovery and we offer after school tutoring from 2:45-4:15 p.m. in the library on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays.

Credit Recovery Intersession – April 6-10 from 9:00 am-1:00 pm Students will have the opportunity to **recover deficient credits** (either continuing in the A+ class they are currently enrolled or begin working on a class they failed). It is a great opportunity for all students 9th-12th grade to recover the credit that they will need for graduation. Please call or see your counselor to sign up.

I am pleased to announce that over **288** 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students achieved a grade point average of 3.7 or better and **102** 9th grade students earned a grade point average of 3.7. As successful as many of our students were during the first semesters, there were 157 students (39-9th grade, 53-10th grade, 35-11th grade and 30-12th grade) who received three or more failing grades

I am also happy to report that 106 students (43-9th grade, 31-10th grade, 17-11th grade, and 15-12th grade) had Perfect Attendance for the first semester. This is a significant achievement and speaks well of the serious attitude these students have toward their education. Many teachers indicated that non-attendance and lack of homework were factors that contributed to these students' lack of success. As I said at our Open House in September, "It takes a community to educate a child." As parents, I encourage you to be an active part of your child's educational community. Please log into Infinite Campus to view your student's grades and attendance. If you have any questions, you may conveniently email their teacher/s or feel to call the school to leave a message.

"We the People" is a high school government class that provides students with a course of instruction on U.S. constitutional democracy. Students develop the knowledge, skills, and disposition of U.S. citizenship as they present in simulated congressional hearings in front of prominent community members such as Nevada Supreme Court justices and university professors. Wow, what a great opportunity for the future leaders of our city, state, and nation. This program was established in

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1987 under the Commission on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution. It is directed by the Center for Civic Education and funded in Nevada largely by the State Bar of Nevada.

Three teams from the North and five from the South gualified for the state competition which was held in Las Vegas on February 7th. Reed won the state competition and will represent Nevada at the national competition April 23-28 in Washington DC. 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ATTENDANCE

The Washoe County School District **attendance policy** states that all students are required to attend school for a minimum of 90% of the scheduled classes in order to receive credit. The emphasis of the attendance policy is on the importance of keeping students in school and providing access to the curriculum.

Fortunately, not all absences count against the 90%. For example, if your child misses school for a medical reason (MED), or doctor excused (EMD), school business (SCH), or a circumstance (CIR), those days are not counted against the 90%. Therefore, at Reed High School, **90% attendance translates to no more than nine (9) unverified absences per semester**.

Absence types that do count against the 90% attendance rule are absent unknown (AUK), domestic (DOM), truant (CT/CLT) parent note/call after 3 days (NCU). If your child does miss school, please make sure you send a note or make a phone call into the attendance office (321-3110) within 3 days of the absence. If you call outside of office hours, please leave a message. Voicemail messages are checked regularly.

On another note, if your student is leaving during school hours for a medical appointment, please notify the attendance office at least an hour in advance of the time your student will be leaving. This will allow time for the attendance office to write and deliver the off-campus pass to your student and you will not have to wait when you arrive to pick-up your student.

Truancy and Driver's Permit/License—New Law

Truancy is a challenge for many of our schools, but a new Nevada law could affect a student's ability to get a driver's permit or license, depending on whether they are attending class. Senate Bill 269 goes into effect on January 1, 2015, and it dictates that persons under the age of 18 who are requesting an instruction permit or

driver's license from the Nevada DMV must present proof that they regularly attend classes in compliance with Nevada school attendance requirements. This will affect students who have been declared truant three or more times in a single school year (habitual truants). School principals or their designees must sign a DMV form stating that the student is attending class regularly before a student can receive a driver's permit or license. Students can submit their completed form (use dark blue or black ink only) to Mrs. Coffman. Please allow for a 24 hour turnaround. The DMV form has been posted on the District website.

A FIT FOR PERFECT ATTENDANCE

At the beginning of this school year, seniors were informed of this district-wide perfect attendance contest. The grand prize is one (1) 2015 Honda Fit from Bill Pearce Motors MSRP valued at \$17,115. The contest is open to all seniors enrolled in an accredited high school in Washoe County, NV, including public, private, and charter schools. Excluded are on-line schools. Seniors must have perfect attendance during the 2014-15 school year. No more than (2) "excused absences" will be allowed. Official school business will count as a day of attendance. To be eligible, the student must also receive a standard, advanced, honors, or adjusted diploma. He or she must not have had any documented disciplinary action, as defined by the school the student attends during his or her senior year. ONE (1) winner will be chosen by random drawing of all eligible students with perfect attendance. All eligible students must be present to win at the grand prize drawing Saturday, June 20th, 2015, at 1 PM at Bill Pearce Honda in Reno, NV.

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There are many students who are rarely or never late. These students can look forward to receiving **H.O.T. Passes** (as long as they don't have unexcused absences), which can be used to get out of a detention or turned in at the end of the year for a chance at raffle prizes. There are those few, however, who are frequently or chronically tardy to school and class, which is disruptive to the teaching and learning environment already taking place.

Please review your child's **attendance** on **Infinite Campus**. Tardies are indicated by UMI (Unexcused Missed Instruction). The vast majority of tardies occur in the morning. If a problem is apparent, please impress upon your child the importance of punctuality and help him or her make a plan for arriving to school and class on time.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT

If your student is planning to take an **Advanced Placement** (AP) class next year, please mark your calendar for the evening of February 25th, to attend AP/College and Career Night from 6:00 to 8:00, in the Theater. Counselors and AP teachers will present important information and be available to answer your questions.

AP EXAM FEES

If your child is enrolled in one or more AP classes, exam fees are due: \$91 per exam. Please see our bookkeeper, Mrs. Fleming, to pay for exams or set up a payment plan.

PSAT/NMSQT

The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) is a program cosponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). It's a standardized test that provides firsthand practice for the SAT[®]. It also gives juniors a chance to enter NMSC scholarship programs and gain access to college and career planning tools. The PSAT/NMSQT measures:

- Critical reading skills
- Math problem-solving skills
- Writing skills

Freshmen, sophomores, and juniors are eligible to take the PSAT/NMSQT, which will be administered in October of this year. More information will follow.

Additionally, students who took the PSAT/NMSQT in October 2014 should have all received their results by now. If you have any questions, please contact your student's counselor.

Student Loans: Avoiding Deceptive Offers

A joint publication of the Federal Trade Commission and the U.S. Department of Education

An education beyond high school is an investment in your future. It can be expensive and often requires you or your family to take out loans to help pay for it. Student loans fall into two categories, federal loans and private loans.

Federal loans, which are subject to oversight and regulation by the federal government, include: — Direct Loans, where the U.S. Department of Education is the lender;

— Federal Family Education Loans (FFEL), where private lenders make loans backed by the federal government; and

— Federal Perkins Loans.

Private loans, sometimes referenced as "alternative loans," are offered by private lenders and do not include the benefits and protections available with federal loans. Whether you're taking out a new student loan or consolidating existing education loans, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), the nation's consumer protection agency, and the U.S. Department of Education (ED), the agency that oversees federal student loans, want you to know how to spot potentially deceptive claims or business practices some private companies may use to get your loan business.

<u>Private Loans</u>

Private companies may offer you loans and other forms of financial assistance for your education. They often use direct mail marketing, telemarketing, television, radio, and online advertising to promote their products. (Continued on page 2)

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


Paying for your education is a serious long-term financial obligation; that's why comparing the costs of different ways of financing your education is so important. Private loans tend to have higher fees and interest rates than federal government loans. Private loans also do not offer the opportunities for cancellation or loan forgiveness that are available on many federal loan programs. So it makes good financial sense to exhaust your federal loan options (as well as grants and scholarships) before considering loans from any private companies. How to Spot Deceptive Private Student Loan **Practices**

If you are considering a private student loan, it's important to know whom you're doing business with and the terms of the loan. The FTC and ED offer these tips to help you recognize questionable claims and practices related to private student loans.

 \rightarrow Some private lenders and their marketers use names, seals, logos, or other representations similar to those of government agencies to create the false or misleadina impression that they are part of or affiliated with the federal government and its student loan programs. \rightarrow ED does not send advertisements or mailers, or otherwise solicit consumers to borrow money. If you receive a student loan solicitation, it is not from ED. \rightarrow Don't let promotions or incentives like gift cards, credit cards, and sweepstakes prizes divert you from assessing whether the key terms of the loan are reasonable. \rightarrow Don't give out personal information on the phone, through the mail, or over the Internet unless you know with whom you are dealing. Private student lenders typically ask for your student account number — often your Social Security number (SSN) or Personal Identification Number (PIN) — saying they need it to help determine your eligibility. However, because scam artists who purport to be private student lenders can misuse this information, it is critical to provide it or other personal information only if you have confidence in the private student lender with whom you are dealing. \rightarrow Check out the track record of particular private student lenders with your state Attorney General (www.naag.org), your local consumer protection agency (www.consumeraction.gov), and the Better Business Bureau (www.bbb.org).

Scholarships are available all year long but it is up to students to know the application deadlines and keep track of them. Here are some tips for finding scholarship applications and information:

Beware of Scholarship Scams!


There are many people out there trying to take advantage of students and parents looking for scholarships. Beware of the following:

- Scholarship search sites/organization guarantees—only the organization/person awarding the money can make guarantees.
- Required payments—scholarship organizations are in the business of giving money away; they shouldn't be asking you for it.
- Required bank/credit card information—there is no reason a legitimate organization would need this information.
- Vague instructions/responses from organization—a legitimate organization should be upfront about whatever you want to know.

Featured Fact: Official Transcripts

Throughout the college and scholarship application process you will be asked to submit official transcripts. Transcripts can be sent electronically through a program called Parchment through <u>http://exchange.parchment.com/</u>. Visit the website then click on "Students" near the upper right-hand corner. Complete the required registration steps listed. Be sure to select the options that apply to you.






