Letter from the Principal

Dear Parents and Guardians:

Happy New Year! This year has gone by so quickly. It is hard to believe that it is 2014. With our new calendar schedule, we will be starting second semester on January 13. My hope is that our students and families found the calendar changes with the semester ending before the holiday break beneficial.

Two of the goals of the Washoe County School District and its high schools are to increase the **graduation rate** and prepare our graduates for the challenges of life after high school. Increasing the graduation rate will take the combined efforts of administrators, counselors, teachers, students, and parents.

I am pleased to announce that Reed High School received \$76,691 in Intervention Funds to assist with **credit recovery** efforts so that all seniors have the opportunity to graduate. What this will take is a concerted effort on the part of students and parents to take advantage of these programs.

 Since we have gone to a seven period day, one of the advantages is to be able to offer credit recovery classes during the school day. What was discovered is that many students need a mentor to monitor their progress and administer their tests. Our guidance department has been talking with seniors primarily, but also underclass students who are credit deficient, to enroll in credit recovery classes. If you have any questions on your student's status, please call your child's counselor.

- 2. An after-school tutoring program staffed by Highly Qualified teachers is available in the library Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays from 2:45-4:15 p.m. for any students who may need additional help with assignments and homework. Parents may receive a note from their student's teachers that due to his/her homework not being completed, the student may be assigned to after-school tutoring.
- A Graduation Specialist and Attendance Monitor have been hired to keep in contact with parents regarding their student's credit status and attendance issues.
- 4. With the High School Proficiency Examinations scheduled for the first week in March, money had been designated for HSPE Review. February 2, 9, 16, and 23, which are Saturdays, are scheduled for HSPE review for regular education and special education students. The programs are scheduled from 9:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m.
- A+ and Plato Summer School & HSPE remediation for the July test will be offered (AT NO CHARGE) to seniors who need to recover credits for summer graduation.

The plan is in place, the teachers are dedicated and committed, and now are ready to assist all seniors and juniors who want to take advantage of a program which will help them participate in graduation activities.

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Reed High School was informed that we will graduate on Saturday, June 14, at 7:00 p.m. at Lawlor Events Center. Our graduates are scheduled for practice at 4:30 p.m. that evening immediately before graduation.

One major change that takes place beginning immediately is that no Certificates of Attendance may be issued at graduation. What this means is that students who cross the stage at graduation must do so with 22¹/₂ credits and having passed all portions of the High School Proficiency Examinations including Math, Science, Reading and Writing. Special Education students with an IEP and receiving an Adjusted Diploma may participate in the graduation ceremony. The State Superintendent of Instruction indicated that he will grant no exceptions. In the past, students who participated in the graduation ceremony either received a standard diploma having obtained 22 ¹/₂ credits and passed all portions of the HSPE or a Certificate of Attendance which indicated that a student received 22 $\frac{1}{2}$ credits but did not pass all or some parts of the HSPE. If your son or daughter is in this situation, please know there are two more attempts to pass the HSPE in March and April as well as classes that can be taken during the school day such as Terry DeBarger's Writing Proficiency class, Kellie Kareck's Math Proficiency class, Dean Pereos' Science Proficiency class, Peggy Stover's Reading Proficiency class, as well as A+ classes offered every period which offer remediation in HSPE subjects.

I encourage your sons and daughters to take the ACT and SAT test for college. According to ACTIVITY, a publication of the College Board, "The ACT score results once again show a strong relationship between high school course taking and college and career readiness. Students who took the recommended minimum core curriculum in high school, four years of English and three years each of mathematics, science, and social studies-were much more likely than those who took less than the core requirements to meet or surpass the ACT College Readiness Benchmarks in each subject area. Students who took additional courses beyond the core curriculum were even more likely to achieve the benchmark scores.' The article continues, "We can't stress enough how important high school course selection is in the college and career readiness process. It's very clear that students who take the right courses are much more likely to be ready for success after high school than those who don't." We offer through A+ classes ACT review as well Accuplacer review for those students wishing to attend TMCC.

In February, current 9th, 10th and 11th grade students will receive their **course offering guide** for the 2014-2015 school year. The course offering guide will be on line. Please take the time to review this curriculum guide with your student to determine course selections for the next school year. Please consider both **Advancement Placement** and **Honors** classes as part of their schedule.

Assistant Principal (Junior Class) ~ Attendance & Advanced Placement

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ATTENDANCE

The Washoe County School District attendance policy states that all students are required to attend school for a minimum of 90% of the scheduled classes in order to receive credit. The policy applies even if the student is passing their classes academically. In other words, it is possible to pass a class academically and still fail the course due to lack of attendance.

We are at the semester's end and often there are questions/concerns that arise in relation to school attendance. WCSD attendance policy states that to earn credit in a class, students are required to attend 90% of each scheduled class. The policy applies even if the student has a passing grade in the class. In other words, it is possible to pass a class academically and still fail the course if a student has 10 unexcused absences.

Absences considered **unexcused** include AUK (absence unknown), DOM (domestic), CT (confirmed truant), and CTL (confirmed truant letter). If your student has accumulated 10 or more of these absence types, in any combination, please contact my office as soon as possible. Also, when your student does miss school, please send a note or call the attendance office within three days of the absence.

On another note, if your student is leaving during school hours for a medical appointment, please notify the attendance office at least an hour in advance of the time your student will be leaving. This will allow time for the attendance office to write and deliver the off-campus pass to your student and you will not have to wait when you arrive to pick-up your student.

TARDIES


Being on time to class results in fewer disruptions to the learning environment and is good training for the future world of employment.

Students with no unexcused tardies in a month are rewarded with a HOT Pass which can be used to excuse a detention or be turned in at the end of the year for a chance to win a variety of raffle prizes.

You are encouraged to review your student's attendance on **Infinite Campus.** Tardies are noted as UMI (unexcused missed instruction). The majority of tardies occur in the morning and after lunch. Students who are tardy to classes in the morning are assigned a 10 minute detention at the end of the period before lunch. Students who are tardy to classes in the afternoon are assigned a 10 minute detention after the last period of the day. If you see that your student has accumulated several UMI's, please have a discussion about the importance of arriving to school and class on time.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT

If your student is planning to take as Advanced Placement (AP) class next year, please mark your calendar for the evening of February 12th, to attend AP/College and Career Night from 6:00 to 8:00, in the Theater. Counselors and AP teachers will present important information and be available to answer your questions.

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Freshman

A particular area of focus at Reed is always helping our freshmen successfully transition to high school. So far we are very pleased with their progress. At the end of the 9 week grade check 175 of our freshmen were earning a 3.5 GPA or better. 37 of them had a perfect 4.0. Getting good grades is a reward all its own but to recognize their diligent work, each of these students received 8 coupons allowing them to go off campus at lunch. Success in academic classes is critical to not only graduating from high school but additional opportunities beyond high school. A great resource we have available for students is after-school tutoring. This takes place in the library every Monday, Tuesday and Thursday from 2:45 to 4:15. Your students can receive great one-on-one assistance with all of their academic work. Please encourage them to take advantage of this resource.

This year we started a **freshman Seminar class**. In this class your student is receiving mini-lessons on academic subjects as well as social and emotional skills necessary for success. Your student will also have time to work on homework or test preparation for other classes. All of these classes have upperclassmen serving as mentors. This is another great opportunity for your student to receive academic support. Please encourage them to use their time wisely in this class.

Off-Campus

We are quickly approaching the end of the semester. At the semester there are additional incentives to earn off campus lunch privileges. For freshmen they need to pass all of their classes and earn at least a 3.0. If they do, they will receive an off-campus student ID badge and be allowed off-campus every day so long as they display this ID.

Students in grades 10-12 who are credit deficient did not start off the year with off-campus privileges. They can earn those at the semester as long as they pass all of their classes. They will need to bring their report card to SRO and we will print them a new off-campus student ID badge allowing them full off campus privileges.

To earn or keep off campus privileges for the 14-15 school year, students must earn their credits. Credit requirements for off campus privileges are as follows:

Freshman – No privileges until the semester Sophomores – 5.5 credits Juniors – 11.5 credits Seniors – 17 credits

Signs of Suicide (SOS) Program

Reed High School participated in the SOS Program in December. Counselors presented information about warning signs of suicide and discussed with students the appropriate steps for helping themselves and others. A copy of the handout students received during this presentation has been included in this newsletter. If you have questions about the material that was presented, please contact your student's counselor.

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WARNING SIGNS OF SUICIDE

Warning signs are observable changes, behaviors, or statements that indicate directly or indirectly that an individual is contemplating suicide.

FEELINGS:

- \Rightarrow Hopeless—"Things will never get better." "There's no point in trying."
- ⇒ Worthless—"Everyone would be better off without me."
- \Rightarrow Helpless—"There's nothing I can do about it." "I can't do anything right."
- ⇒ Guilt, shame, self-hatred—"What I did was unforgivable." "I'm useless."
- \Rightarrow Pervasive sadness
- \Rightarrow Persistent anxiety
- \Rightarrow Persistent agitation
- ⇒ Persistent, uncharacteristic anger, hostility, or irritability
- ⇒ Confusion—can't think straight or make decisions

ACTIONS:

- \Rightarrow Uncharacteristic aggression
- \Rightarrow Risk taking
- ⇒ Withdrawing from friends/activities
- \Rightarrow Becoming accident prone
- ⇒ Recent losses—death, divorce, relationship, job, status, self-esteem
- \Rightarrow Getting into trouble, discipline problems
- \Rightarrow Drug or alcohol abuse
- \Rightarrow Themes of death or destruction in talk, writing, or websites

CHANGE:

- ⇒ Personality—more withdrawn, low energy, "don't care" attitude or more boisterous, talkative, outgoing
- \Rightarrow Can't concentrate on school, work, routine tasks
- \Rightarrow Loss of interest in hobbies or work
- \Rightarrow Marked decrease in school or work performance
- \Rightarrow Sleep, appetite increase/decrease
- \Rightarrow Sudden improvement after being down or withdrawn

THREATS:

- ⇒ Statements talking about suicide directly or indirectly, written themes of death, preoccupation with death
- \Rightarrow Threats—"I won't be around much longer," writing suicide note, making a direct threat
- ⇒ Plans—giving away prized possessions, making arrangements for a funeral, studying drug effects, obtaining a weapon
- \Rightarrow Attempts to kill themselves, such as through an overdose

ACT®: ACKNOWLEDGE, CARE, TELL

ACKNOWLEDGE: Admit that you are seeing the signs of depression or suicide in a friend and that it is serious.

CARE: Let your friend know that you care about him or her, and that you are concerned that he or she needs help you cannot provide.

TELL: Inform a trusted adult, either with your friend or on his or her behalf.

MYTHS ABOUT DEPRESSION AND SUICIDE

Myths about depression and suicide often separate people from the effective treatments now available and prevent people from supporting suicide prevention efforts. School staff, students, and their parents need to know the facts.

- **MYTH:** It's normal for teenagers to be moody; teens don't suffer from "real" depression.
- **FACT:** Depression can affect people at any age or of any race, ethnicity, or economic group.
- **MYTH:** Teens who claim to be depressed are weak and just need to pull themselves together. There's nothing anyone else can do to help.
- **FACT:** Depression is not a weakness, but a serious health disorder. Both young people and adults who are depressed need professional treatment. A trained therapist or counselor can help them learn more positive ways to think about themselves, change behavior, cope with problems, or handle relationships. A physician can prescribe medications to help relieve the symptoms of depression. For many people, a combination of psychotherapy and medication is beneficial.
- **MYTH:** People who talk about suicide won't really do it.
- FACT: Almost everyone who dies by suicide has given some clue or warning. Do not ignore suicide threats. Statements like, "You'll be sorry when I'm dead," or "I can't see any way out"—no matter how casually or jokingly said—may indicate serious suicidal feelings.
- **MYTH:** If a person is determined to kill themselves, nothing is going to stop them.
- **FACT:** Even the most severely depressed person has mixed feelings about death, wavering until the very last moment between wanting to live and wanting to die. Most suicidal people do not want death; they want the pain to stop. The impulse to end it all, however overpowering, does not last forever.
- **MYTH:** People who complete suicide are people who were unwilling to seek help.
- **FACT:** Studies of suicide victims have shown that more than half had sought medical help within six months before their death.
- **MYTH:** Talking about suicide may give someone the idea.
- **FACT:** You don't give a suicidal person morbid ideas by talking about suicide. The opposite is true. Bringing up the subject of suicide and discussing it openly is one of the most helpful things you can do. There is no evidence that screening youth for suicide induces suicidal thinking or behavior.

Additionally, the District, in its discretion and without a statement of reason, may require a complete criminal history check on any volunteer at any time. In programs where a volunteer is an Overnight Chaperone and may work alone for extended periods of time with a student or by request from the principal, fingerprinting and a full state and federal background check are required. If fingerprinting is required, the school district will cover these costs. All fingerprinting must be authorized.
- **Confidentiality:** What you hear and observe about students, families, and staff while volunteering in a school is **confidential.** Repeating a seemingly harmless comment can lead to misunderstandings and hurt feelings. For schools to provide the best environment for learning, everyone's privacy must be respected.
- Liability: The Washoe County School District is proud to provide liability coverage and an accident policy for its volunteers, which will provide up to \$1,500 after any other valid and collectable insurance. In order to have this protection, all volunteers must sign in on the school's volunteer / visitor sign in sheet (in every school office) every time they volunteer. Volunteers are not covered by Workers' Compensation.
- <u>Child neglect</u> and abuse reporting: School volunteers are obligated under mandatory child reporting laws to report any suspected child neglect or abuse. Please refer to Washoe County School District mandatory reporting guidelines.
- **Supervision:** Volunteers perform under the direction and supervision of school personnel. Volunteers should know and follow school policies and rules. Dear Parent:

During the 2013 Session of the Nevada Legislature, Assembly Bill 288 passed into law and became effective July 1, 2013. One of the provisions of the new law is that school districts are no longer able to issue a certificate of attendance or any other document indicating that a student attended high school but did not meet the requirements for a standard diploma or an adjusted diploma.

Nevada Revised Statute (NRS) 389.805 (4) Now reads: If a pupil does not satisfy the requirements prescribed by the State Board to receive a standard high school diploma, the pupil must not be issued a certificate of attendance or any other document indicating that the pupil attended high school but did not satisfy the requirements for such a diploma. The provisions of this subsection do not apply to a pupil who receives an adjusted diploma.(Added to NRS by 2007, 1076; A 2009, 351, 2619; 2013, 3278)

Because the Washoe County School District can no longer issue a certificate of attendance and because this law became effective July 1, 2013, the graduating class of 2014 must meet all the requirements of a standard diploma including passage of all portions of the high school proficiency exam to participate in the graduation ceremony. This does not apply to students who receive an adjusted diploma. Additionally, the standard diploma is the minimum requirement. Student receiving an honors or advanced diploma will have met the minimum requirement of a standard diploma.

What Information Do I Need To Fill Out The FAFSA?

information, for you (and your spouse, if you are married), and for your parents if you are providing parent information

• If you have not yet filed an income tax return, complete and submit the FAFSA using estimated tax information

• Use income records for the year prior to the academic year for which you are applying. For instance, if you are filling out the 2014–15 FAFSA, you will need 2013 tax information → Records of your untaxed income, such as child support received, interest income, and veterans non-education benefits, for you, and for your parents if you are providing parent information

 \rightarrow Information on cash; savings and checking account balances; investments, including real estate but not including the home in which you live; and business and farm assets for you, and for your parents if you are providing parent information

** If you file your taxes before filling out your FAFSA online, you might be able to have your tax information automatically retrieved from the IRS and inserted in your FAFSA. The FAFSA will walk you through the process.

Featured Fact: What is FAFSA?

FAFSA stands for "The Free Application for Federal Student Aid". The FAFSA is an online form that can be prepared annually by current and prospective college students (undergraduate and graduate) in the United States to determine their eligibility for student financial aid (including the Pell Grant, Federal Student Loans and Federal Work-Study).

All students are expected to contribute towards the cost of their college education. How much you and your family will be expected to contribute depends on your financial situation—and is what is referred to as your Expected Family Contribution or EFC.


The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the form used by the U.S. Department of Education to determine your Expected Family Contribution (EFC) by conducting a "need analysis" based on financial information, such as income, assets and other household information, which you (and your parents if you are a dependent student) will be asked to provide. The form is submitted to, and processed by, a federal processor contracted by the U.S. Department of Education (ED), and the results are electronically transmitted to the financial aid offices of the schools that you list on your application.

FAFSA is the application used by nearly all colleges and universities to determine eligibility for federal, state, and college-sponsored financial aid, including grants, educational loans, and work-study programs.

The FAFSA application should take about one hour to fill out, but this is only if you have all the necessary documents at hand before you begin. Some applicants get frustrated with the application process because they do not have ready access to all necessary tax forms and bank statements, so be sure to plan ahead before you sit down to complete your FAFSA.

FAFSA Deadlines: For federal aid, submit your application as early as possible, but no earlier than January 1st of the year you plan to attend college. You MUST file a new FAFSA every year in order to be considered for financial aid. These forms are available each January. <u>http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/</u>

- Required bank/credit card information—there is no reason a legitimate organization would need this information.
- Vague instructions/responses from organization—a legitimate organization should be upfront about whatever you want to know.




