

Letter from the Principal

Dear Parents and Guardians:

In a recent publication from Activity, a publication from ACT, an article addressed Common Standards and Assessments. "Many states (including Nevada) have committed to adopting the Common Core State Standards, but numerous questions remain. How should they implement the standards to ensure every high school student graduates ready for college and careers? What will common assessments look like? What does the United States need to do to bring its education system up to the levels of high performing countries?" The Common Core Standards of English Language and Literacy demand that every educator plays a critical role creating highly literate students. The Common Core State Standards for mathematical practices are essential components in developing the mathematical understanding of students. Educators must intentionally provide students opportunities to use the mathematical practices to foster their understanding.

Please be assured that the Reed High staff will keep abreast of the most current data of Common Core State Standards which will be implemented in English and mathematics courses for the 2012-13 school year. The other core classes will follow suit in the 2013-2014 school year. "As states raise academic standards and graduation requirements: The link between strong academic preparation in high school and success in college and careers is clearer than it has ever been. Whether high school graduates go directly to college or into the workplace, they need advanced skills if they are going to be successful (Peltzman, Vranek & Bodary, 2007, p.1). The authors continue "The primary tool for enhancing the value of a high school diploma is a more inclusive curriculum that includes more credits in core academic subjects and more advanced coursework.

How does the secondary school curriculum affect students' college readiness and opportunity for success? Descriptive studies and statistical analysis reveal a fairly consistent association between higher level coursework, particularly in mathematics and science."

I encourage you during the month of March to sit down with your child when he/she brings home the Reed High School course selection sheet. Please look it over to determine which classes your child should be enrolled in for the 2012-2013 school year. Due to economic concerns, the course catalog is online on Reed's Web site (http://www.washoe.k12.nv.us/reed/content/ registration.html) rather than in printed form. Please encourage your child to take Advanced Placement and Honor-level courses. colleges not only look at Grade Point Averages, but also consider SAT and ACT scores as well as the number of AP and Honor classes on a student's transcript. As you know, the student with the highest GPA (Grade Point Average) will have the value added to Honors and Advanced Placement classes for the purpose of selecting the Valedictorian and Salutatorian. All honor courses have an added value of .025. Advanced Placement classes have the added value of .05.

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Graduation is scheduled for Wednesday, June 6th at 7:00 p.m. at the Reno-Sparks Convention Center. The move was made to the Reno-Sparks Convention Center due to extensive road construction scheduled for Virginia Street in the spring.



First semester report cards were given to students on February 3. If you did not receive your child's report card, please call or drop by the school office for a copy. I am pleased to announce that over 218 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students achieved a grade point average of 3.7 or better and 64 9th grade students earned a grade point average of 3.7. I am also happy to report that 123 students (41-9th grade, 29-10th grade, 29-11th grade, and 24 -12th grade) had perfect attendance for the first semester. This is a significant achievement and speaks well of the serious attitude these students have toward their education.

As successful as many of our students were during the first semesters, there were 98 students who received three or more failing grades. Many teachers indicated that non-attendance and lack of homework were factors that contributed to the students' lack of success. As I said at our Open House in September, "It takes a community to educate a child." As parents, I encourage you to be an active part of your child's educational community. Please log into Infinite Campus to view your student's grades and attendance. If you have any questions, you may conveniently e-mail their teacher/s or feel free to call the school and leave a message.


One of the most important events in your student's high school career will

take place the second week the **HIGH** in March: SCHOOL **PROFICIENCY** examinations in MATH. SCIENCE, READING, and WRITING. This will be the first HSPE testing for sophomores in Math, Science, and

Reading. Any junior who did not pass all or any part of the four tests will again be tested at that time. The junior testing is especially important since it will determine Reed High School's Annual Yearly Progress. And for senior students, successfully passing all parts of the High School Proficiency Examinations along with 22.5 credits will allow your son and/or daughter to graduate with a standard, advanced, or Honors diploma. Your encouragement for your student to get a good night's sleep, eat a good breakfast, and to take these tests seriously is imperative to their success.

Testing dates for all sophomores and any junior and senior who have not yet passed: Math-March 6, Writing-March 7 (only juniors and seniors who did not pass previously), Reading-March 8 and Science-March 9. There will be a three hour delayed start on March 6, 8, & 9.

process helps teachers focus and reflect usefully on their practice, and I always strive to be a reflective practitioner. The process did indeed do that, and I'm grateful for the revisions and adaptations I've made in the wake of certification. Working closely with colleagues as we worked together toward this goal was rewarding and enlightening. Videotaping class lessons led to some pretty funny and awkward moments in front of the camera, but perhaps the most meaningful moments came from the one-on -one work I did with the individual students I chose for Entry 1. I really had to think about what I do to support both those who have challenged themselves to rise up to advanced placement classes and those who struggle to meet the basic standards and proficiencies of high school. These are lasting memories."

Terry DeBarger comments "I am never bored at work, and I count myself lucky to be able to say that. Before coming to teaching fifteen years ago, this wasn't the case. As a Billinghurst Middle School English teacher for seven years and a Reed High school English teacher for eight. I've enjoyed the constant change and challenge of teaching. Pursuing National Board Certification posed an additional professional challenge that has culminated in tangible rewards and inestimable opportunity for reflection. Planning, writing, video recording, reflecting with colleagues, and writing again, has made me appreciate my work and my good luck.

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Uniform Discussion

As you may have heard, Reed High School is exploring the option of uniforms for the 2012-13 school year. We held one parent meeting on January 12 and will hold another parent meeting on April 4th at 6:00 p.m. in the Cafeteria. We most certainly want parental input in this decision. We will also talk with students and faculty in this process.

The idea of school uniforms was developed back in 2009 as part of our Northwest Accreditation process - Goal 3: To improve the safety and security of our campus community for students and staff. The action step stated "Adopt a school uniform policy for all students. This would make all Reed students more readily identifiable." We are finally in the discussion stages at this time and your input is vital. Since most of our feeder middle schools have uniforms, it seemed like a good time to discuss the topic.

I would like to reiterate from the previous newsletter that before any decision is made, we will:

- discuss the concept at parent group meetings
- 2) discuss the idea at a staff meeting
- 3) gather student input
- 4) hold parent meetings in the evening
- give parents who could not attend the meetings the opportunity to fill out surveys.

We hope to make an **informed** decision with input and discussion with all Reed High School stakeholders.

If you would like to be on the **initial committee**, please **e-mail** me.

For the 2012-2013 school year we are tentatively expecting approximately 1960 students. Please know that we will continue to offer top notch required and elective courses, provide a safe and secure environment, and continue to pursue our Northwest Association of School and Accountability Goals that include:




Attendance at these tests is **mandatory**.

Supervision after School:

There is no supervision after **3:30 PM** at Reed High School. Due to the liability of the school, we are asking parents to arrange transportation for your student after school. Administration and

teachers are in offices and classrooms but not monitoring the building. If your school business, includes but are not limited to NJROTC, athletics, practice, games, theater, rehearsals, teacher tutoring etc., you may remain on campus but there must be adult supervision.

Uniforms:

Reed HS has had two student/staff meetings and one parent meeting to discuss the pros and cons of school uniforms. We will have one more parent meeting and one more student/staff meeting before it goes to a vote. We encourage your **input** and will remind you through Connect Ed before the next parent meeting.

Canine Searches:

The school district may conduct searches of school hallways, lockers, classrooms, buildings, parking lots and other school property through the use of a canine unit. A canine unit consists of a qualified handler, and a dog specially trained to detect illegal or prohibited substances, weapons or bombs. If a teacher, administrator, other school official, employee, school police, or security personnel, have a **reasonable suspicion** to believe that a student or students have in his/her possession a weapon or a controlled substance or material which is prohibited by law or school district rules, regulations and policies, a search may be conducted of a student by the canine unit on campus. Such a search of a student may only be conducted on reasonable suspicion, described above.

It is extremely important that RHS students attend all classes on a regular basis. If your son/daughter must be absent from school, please read below to fully understand the Washoe County School District Attendance Policy.

- 1) Students are required to attend 100% of all scheduled classes, unless otherwise excused.
- 2) All parent notes must include the student's name and be signed by a parent/legal guardian.
- Parent notes or parent calls are required to excuse prearranged absences and obtain verification of those appointments with the school's attendance office (775-353-5700).
- 4) Absences for extenuating circumstances must be pre-arranged with the school's attendance office and be approved by the Lead Attendance Administrator, Kathie Smith. Failure to complete this process may result in the absence being classified as UNV (Unverified).
- 5) Parents/guardians are highly encouraged to call the school's attendance office, prior to 9:00 a.m. if their student is home ill. This procedure will help the office know the whereabouts of students. The school will make telephone contact with parent/guardian after the student's absence.
- 6) The limitation of absences is six (6) domestic (dom), unverified (unv), or truant (ct) absences per semester. This is in accordance with the 90% rule for a block schedule school. On the student's seventh (7th) domestic, unverified, or truant absence, the student may lose credit in the class.
- "Circumstance" (cir) absences are limited to five/class/ semester. These absences do not count towards the 90% attendance rule.

Please make it a priority to consistently check your son/daughter's attendance through **Infinite Campus**. If Internet access is an issue, you may come to the school and request a printout from the attendance office.

TARDY POLICY

The Reed High School staff emphasizes the importance of punctuality through consistently addressing unexcused tardies. We believe that being punctual to class teaches respect, dependability, time management, and shows that a student is fully committed to their education/job.

Please continue to emphasize the importance of promptness and remind your son/daughter to carry their school identification (ID) card every day. If a student does not have their ID, they will be sent to the main office to purchase an ID. If a student habitually forgets their ID, a referral will be sent to their grade level Administrator.

We appreciate the continued parent support.

- All students tardy to class will swipe their student identification card through the tardy machine and obtain a printed pass. The tardy machines are located at the attendance office, the red hall, and the PE hall.
- The student will take the printed pass and hand it to their teacher upon entry. If a student does not have a tardy pass, they will be sent to obtain a pass.
- All students who receive a tardy pass will automatically be administered a 15 minute lunch detention to be served in the small gym.
- If lunch detention is missed, the student will be assigned a Tardy Time Detention. Tardy Time is held every Friday from 2:30-3:30 in the Faculty Dining Room, unless otherwise noted.
- Failure to arrive to Tardy Time will warrant a referral to the Dean of Students or grade level Administrator. Upon referral, the student will be assigned an SRO Friday School, which runs on Friday from 2:30-4:30.

Grieving Teens

Our Reed family has experienced a great deal of tragedy and death this 2011/2012 school year. In these times of sadness, it is important to realize that grieving is a natural and normal

reaction to loss of any kind. Grief may manifest itself in physical, emotional, spiritual, and psychological ways.

As students go through the grieving process they may go through some physical and behavioral changes, such as sleep irregularities, changes in appetite, restlessness, spontaneous crying, anger/irritability, muscle tension/aches, guilt, and depression.





Dear Parent/Guardian:

Welcome back from winter break. We hope you and your family had an enjoyable and healthy holiday. The winter months ahead are not only a time for students to resume their studies, they are also a time when colds, flu, and other communicable diseases are at their peak. The Washoe County School District would like to partner with you to minimize the spread of common childhood illnesses and missed school days. Here are some steps you can take to ensure your child stays healthy and learning-ready this winter season:

- 1. Keep immunizations up-to-date. Vaccines protect your child and the school community from serious, preventable diseases.
- Encourage hand-washing at home. Unwashed hands are a major source of disease transmission; scrubbing hands with soap and water before eating and after use of bathroom facilities is an important way to avoid exposure to many respiratory and stomach illnesses.
- 3. Teach your child good health habits. Even very young children can be taught to "cough or sneeze in your sleeve!"
- 4. While lice are not considered a "disease," they are a nuisance that affects up to 12 million school-aged children each year. Lice don't hop or fly but are spread by direct head-to-head contact or by using an infested brush, hat, or hair accessory. You may want to check your child's head periodically for lice or nits and help him/her understand that some things are not to be shared, even with a sibling or best friend.
- 5. Although lunchtime in the cafeteria is a chance for students to socialize with friends, it can also be an opportunity for viruses and bacteria to pass from one child to another. Discourage your child from sharing their food, beverages, and eating utensils with others.
- 6. And finally, please keep your sick child home. While mild illnesses are not completely preventable when hundreds of children (and their "germs") share the same building, children with fever or signs of moderate illness should not come to school. Not only are they infectious to others but they also need the care and supervision that only a parent can provide.

The Washoe County School District is committed to maintaining a healthy school environment for all students. Our wellness and exclusion policies not only conform to accepted national standards but are designed to promote the health and well-being of all members of our school community.


