## Letter from the Principal

Dear Parents and Guardians:
In a recent publication from Activity, a publication from ACT, an article addressed Common Standards and Assessments. "Many states (including Nevada) have committed to adopting the Common Core State Standards, but numerous questions remain. How should they implement the standards to ensure every high school student graduates ready for college and careers? What will common assessments look like? What does the United States need to do to bring its education system up to the levels of high performing countries?" The Common Core Standards of English Language and Literacy demand that every educator plays a critical role creating highly literate students. The Common Core State Standards for mathematical practice are essential components in developing the mathematical understanding of students. Educators must intentionally provide students opportunities to use the mathematical practices to foster their understanding.

Please be assured that the Reed High staff will keep abreast of the most current data of Common Core State Standards which are currently being implemented in English and Math courses; the other core classes will follow suit in the 2013-2014 school year. "As states raise academic standards and graduation requirements, the link between strong academic preparation in high school and success in college and careers is clearer than it has ever been. Whether high school graduates go directly to college or into the workplace, they need advanced skills if they are going to be successful (Peltzman, Vranek \& Bodary, 2007, p.1). The authors continue, "The primary tool for enhancing the value of a high school diploma is a more inclusive curriculum that includes more credits in core academic subjects and more advanced coursework. How does the secondary
school curriculum affect students' college readiness and opportunity for success? Descriptive studies and statistical analysis reveal a fairly consistent association between higher level coursework, particularly in mathematics and science."

This is why I encourage you during the months of February and March to sit down with your child when he/she brings home the Reed High School Course Selection sheet. Please look it over to determine which classes your child will be enrolled in for the 2013-2014 school year. Due to economic concerns, the course catalog is online at Reed's website rather than in a printed version. Please encourage your child to take Advanced Placement and Honors level courses. Most colleges not only look at Grade Point Averages, but also seriously consider SAT and ACT scores as well as the number of AP and Honors classes on a student's transcript. As you know, the student with the highest GPA (Grade Point Average) will have the value added to Honors and Advanced Placement classes for the purpose of selecting the Valedictorian and Salutatorian. All Honors courses have a value added of .025 and Advanced Placement classes will have the added value of 05 .

As you may have seen in the paper or WCSD website, all high schools in Nevada, through the Nevada Schools Performance Framework, were given a Star Rating ranging from 5 Stars to 1 Star. Reed High School received a three (3) Star rating. Reed High School received 67 out of 100 points possible.

Areas that were rated include:

- Cohort Graduation Rate: $77 \%$ - 15 out of 18 points
- \% passing ALL HSPE tests by the end of grade 11: $74 \%-7$ out of 8 points
- $\%$ of $9^{\text {th }}$ and $10^{\text {th }}$ Graders with Sufficient Credits to be on Track to graduation:


## $86 \%-5$ out of 8 points

- Student Growth Percentile between $8^{\text {th }}$ grade and $10^{\text {th }}$ grade -
2 out of 3 points earned in both Reading and Math
- \% Agreement on student engagement items on Student Climate Survey: 49\%-3 out of 5 points
- $\%$ of students with a (nonemployee) parent logging in to Infinite Campus on their behalf $50 \%$ or $\%$ of students with a parent taking a Parent University class: $1.22 \%-3$ out of 5 points
- Transfer to Alternative Programs (1.98\%) - 6 out of 6 points
- \% Completing 1 or more AP/IB/ Dual Credit Courses by Graduation: $46 \%$ - 2 out of 5 points
- $\%$ of cohort passing at least one AP/IB/Exam by graduation (or 3 Dual Credit Courses): 19\%-2 points out of 5
- \% of graduates earning an Advanced or Honors Diploma: $36 \%-6$ out of 10 points

These are the major categories that the Reed High School communityteachers, students, and parents will work on over the next few years. The administration and faculty will be working on strategies to address many of these issues. We will expand our HSPE remediation classes to $10^{\text {th }}$ and $11^{\text {th }}$ grade students as well as $12^{\text {th }}$ grade students. We will continue to offer through A+ and Plato credit recovery classes for $9^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade students. We will offer A+ classes in ACT to better prepare our students to prepare for college. We hope to increase our Advanced Placement course offering so that more students will have an interest in enrolling in AP classes.

I am delighted to announce that the
Valedictorians for the Class of 2013 is Matthew Smith and Eduardo Martinez Medina and the Salutatorian is Cody Forman. The Top Twenty students for the Class of 2013 in rank order are: Molly Olsen, Logan Vine, Sierra Mooney, Tailer Artis, Emily Carr, Leia Ballesteros, Drew Bryant, Alena Lee, Austin Corbett, Wyatt Williams, KristelAnn Galarce, Kaitlyn McNerney, Mika Watanabe, Heidi Marchant, Katelyn Singer, Spencer Empey, Jacob Striejewske, Tyler Wright, and Jeshua Glanzmann.

Graduation is scheduled for Thursday, June $6^{\text {th }}$ at 12:00 noon at the Lawlor Events Center on the UNR Campus.

First semester report cards were given to the students on February 1. If you did not receive your child's report card, please call or drop by the school office for a copy. If your student did not pass all of their classes, please remember that we offer A+ and Plato classes after school for credit recovery, after school tutoring from $2: 45-4: 15 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. in the library, and after-school open computer labs for students to work on A+ assignments and Plato classes.

I am pleased to announce that over $21810^{\text {th }}, 11^{\text {th }}$, and $12^{\text {th }}$ grade students achieved a grade point average of 3.7 or better and $649^{\text {th }}$ grade students earned a grade point average of 3.7. I am also happy to report that 54 students (16-9th grade, 19-10 th grade, $9-11^{\text {th }}$ grade, and $10-12^{\text {th }}$ grade) had perfect attendance for the first semester. This is a significant achievement and speaks well of the serious attitude these students have toward their education.

As successful as many of our students were during the first semes-
ters, there were 90 students (28-9th grade, $30-10^{\text {th }}$ grade, $20-11^{\text {th }}$ grade and $12-12^{\text {th }}$ grade) who received three or more failing grades. Many teachers indicated that non-attendance and lack of homework were factors that contributed to these students lack of success. As I said at our Open House in September, "It takes a community to educate a child." As parents, I encourage you to be an active part of your child's educational community. Please log into Infinite Campus to view your student's grades and attendance. If you have any questions, please e-mail their teacher/s or feel free to call the school and leave a message.

French students in 3-4, 5-6 Honors and Advanced Placement have been exchanging pen pal letters with students in Tergnier, France, a town two hours away from Paris. French $5-6 \mathrm{H}$ and AP French students are also engaging in a recorded spoken poetry exchange with their pen pals. All three levels of French took class photos to send to their pen pals on 50's Day and Cowboy Day during Winter Homecoming Week.

One of the most important events in your student's high school career will take place the second week in March. That is the March administration of the HIGH SCHOOL PROFICIENCY examinations in MATH, SCIENCE, READING, and WRITING. This will be the first HSPE testing for sophomores in Math, Science, and Reading. Any junior and/or senior student who did not pass all or any part of the four tests will again be tested at this time. The junior testing is especially important since it will determine Reed High School's Annual Yearly Progress and for senior students, successfully passing all parts of the High School Proficiency Examinations along with 22.5 credits will

allow your son and/or daughter to graduate with a standard, Advanced or Honors diploma. Your encouragement for your student to get a good night's sleep, eat a good breakfast, and to take these test seriously is imperative to their success.

Testing dates for all sophomores and any junior and senior who have not yet passed: Math-March 4, Reading-March 5, Writing-March 6 (only juniors and seniors who did not pass previously), and Science-March 7. There will be a three hour delayed start on March 4, 5, \& 7 .

## 2012 Scholastic Art Awards

The Alliance for Young Artists \& Writers celebrates the creative achievement of America's teens with the Scholastic Art and Writing Awards. The Awards were founded in 1923 to offer recognition and scholarships for students for their artistic talents. Awards are based on creativity, concept and technical skill. Students may be awarded a Gold key, Silver keys or an Honorable Mention. The Gold Keys are the highest level of achievement. Silver Keys are awarded for works worthy of recognition on the regional level. An Honorable mention recognizes students with artistic potential and is encouraged to continue to develop their skills and concepts. The program has honored some of our nation's most celebrated artists including Truman Capote, Sylvia Plath, Michael Sarich, Cindy Sherman, Robert Redford, and Andy Warhol. Reed High School students compete against all other Northern Nevada middle and high schools. This year there were over 1300 entries with 565 awards. Reed High School students received a total of 39 awards for outstanding visual art pieces.

The following students received awards: Epiphany Burke - 2 honorable mentions in painting, Jeshua Glanzmann 1 honorable mention, 1 silver key and 1 gold key in painting, Shelby Higa - 1 honorable mention in drawing, Kailey Huckaby 2 honorable mentions in drawing, Marissa Mendoza - 1 gold key in painting, Anne Mueller - a total of 28 awards with 11 gold keys, 12 silver keys, and 5 honorable mentions in a variety of categories, and Hannah Tiner - 2 honorable mentions in photography.

The award winners will have an exhibition of their work at the Holland Project from Friday, March 8 - Friday, March 29. The Holland Project is located at 140 Vesta Street, Reno, Nevada. Gold key winners will have their work exhibited and silver key and honorable mentions will have their work displayed by a digital slide presentation. Congratulations to all of our outstanding young artists!

FRIENDLY REMINDER......
The High School Proficiency Exams (HSPE) will be administered in March. The HSPE will be given to sophomores, juniors, and seniors who still need to earn a passing score. Keeping in mind that these 4 tests (Reading, Math, Science, \& Writing) are REQUIRED for graduation from any Washoe County High School, and your child's attendance and preparation are MANDATORY.

## How To Do Better On Tests

Tests are a part of life... Tests don't just happen in school. Want to get a driver's license? You have to take a test. Want to go to college or get into the armed forces? You'll have to pass a test. Many jobs, from fire fighter to lawyer, require you to pass a test before you can be hired.

## Things to do before test day:

- Don't Cram.

Review in several short study sessions. You'll feel less pressure...and you'll remember more.

- Study with a buddy.

Try reviewing for the test with one or more friends.

- Make flash cards.

Flash cards are a great way to review everything from vocabulary words to match facts. Carry them with you for quick reviews.

- Create a practice test.

As you're studying, try to think of the questions you would ask.

- Make a "Study sheet."

In many subjects, there are a few key facts you need to remember for a test.

- Dress for success.

You don't need to wear your fanciest clothes. But what you wear can affect your performance on a test.

- Eat breakfast.

Even if you usually skip breakfast, have something to eat on test day.

- Take the supplies you need.

Don't wait until the morning of the test to get ready... that's a sure way to make you stressed.

When you're in the testing room:

1) Skim the test quickly. You don't want to turn to the last page of the test with five minutes left in class only to discover you have two essay questions to write. Knowing what's ahead with will help you budget your time.
2) Read the directions carefully. You may want to underline important directions so you don't overlook them. If you're not clear about something in the directions, ask.
3) Don't be afraid to skip a question. If you come across a question you don't know, don't panic... it's just one question. Skip it and move on. Come back if you have time.
4) Look for "clue words." On a multiple choice or a true-false test, some words usually indicate an answer is wrong.
5) If you're using a separate answer sheet, make sure you're filling in answers to the right questions.
6) Check your work. Often, it's a careless mistake that leads to a wrong answer.

## ATTENDANCE

The Washoe County School District attendance policy states that all students are required to attend school for a minimum of $90 \%$ of the scheduled classes in order to receive credit. The policy applies even if the student is passing their classes academically. In other words, it is possible to pass a class academically and still fail the course due to lack of attendance.


Fortunately, not all of the absences count against students. For instance, if your child misses school for a medical reason (MED), a doctor excused day (EMD), a school business day (SCH), or a circumstantial day (CIR) then those days are not counted into the total. Therefore, at Reed High School, 90\% attendance translates to (6) unverified absences per semester.

The absence types that do count toward the six unverified are absent unknown (AUK), domestic (DOM), truant (TRU) and confirmed truant (CT). If your child has accumulated seven or more absences in any combination of these absence types, please contact the attendance office as soon as possible. Also, if your child does miss school, please make sure you send a note or make a phone call into the attendance office (325-8337) within three days of the absence.

## TARDIES



Punctuality makes for fewer interruptions to learning and is one of the traits employers value most. We have worked diligently to reward punctuality and discourage tardiness this year at Reed High School.

There are many students who are rarely or never late. These students can look forward to receiving H.O.T. Passes (as long as they don't have unexcused absences), which can be used to get out of detention or
turned in at the end of the year for a chance at raffle prizes. There are those few, however, who are frequently or chronically tardy to school and class, which can be disruptive to the teaching and learning environment already taking place.

We encourage you to review your child's attendance on Infinite Campus. Tardies are indicated by UMI (Unexcused Missed Instruction). The vast majority of tardies occur in the morning. If a problem is apparent, please impress upon your child the importance of punctuality and help him or her make a plan for arriving to school and class on time.

Furthermore, please look over your son or daughter's attendance portion of the Grade Monitoring Sheet that is assigned to be brought home and signed by you every fourth week of school. Please look for the Grade Monitoring Sheets on the following dates this semester 2/4/13, 3/11/13, 4/15/13, 5/20/13.

We would like to congratulate our Freshman on a great 1st semester of high school. Transitioning to the challenges of high school is difficult and our freshman have done exceptionally well. We are especially proud of the hard work in classes from so many of our Freshman.

If your student is not on track, please have them visit with their counselor about options we have available for them to make up the credit that they may have failed. Of course, the best option is to not fail classes and stay on track from the very beginning.

## ATHLETICS

The Spring sports season is upon us and as we get ready to welcome warmer weather we begin to close the book on our Winter campaigns. It has been an eventful and fast paced Winter as we have seen great competition and drive from our outstanding student athletes. As we go to press, here is a brief recap:

Boys Basketball - The Boys' basketball team is poised to lock down the \#2 seed in the High Desert League. They close out the regular season with Spanish Springs and a win there clinches the second spot in the playoffs and a home playoff game. The Boys' have had a great season and have clinched a playoff berth for the first time in three years. The Boys' will potentially host a first round game before rolling into Carson for the Regional tournament.

Screening: For the safety of students, all prospective volunteers will be asked to complete an Adult School Volunteer Application and provide a photo I.D. (international ID's are accepted). All prospective volunteers will be given a "Background Check" check pursuant to NRS 179D. Additionally, the District, in its discretion and without a statement of reason, may require a complete criminal history check on any volunteer at any time. In programs where a volunteer is an Overnight Chaperone and may work alone for extended periods of time with a student or by request from the principal, fingerprinting and a full state and federal background check are required. If fingerprinting is required, the school district will cover these costs. All fingerprinting must be authorized.
Confidentiality: What you hear and observe about students, families, and staff while volunteering in a school is confidential. Repeating a seemingly harmless comment can lead to misunderstandings and hurt feelings. For schools to provide the best environment for learning, everyone's privacy must be respected.
Liability: The Washoe County School District is proud to provide liability coverage and an accident policy for its volunteers, which will provide up to $\$ 1,500$ after any other valid and collectable insurance. In order to have this protection, all volunteers must sign in on the school's volunteer / visitor sign in sheet (in every school office) every time they volunteer. Volunteers are not covered by Workers' Compensation.
Child neglect and abuse reporting: School volunteers are obligated under mandatory child reporting laws to report any suspected child neglect or abuse. Please refer to Washoe County School District mandatory reporting guidelines.
Supervision: Volunteers perform under the direction and supervision of school personnel. Volunteers should know and follow school policies and rules. The District, in its discretion and without a statement of reasons, may suspend any volunteer from further volunteer activities pending any background check. No statement by the District establishes a property right to perform volunteer work.
Communication: If you are unable to make it to school when you are expected, please call the school and leave a message. Similarly, school staff will contact you if your time is cancelled or changed for any unforeseen reason. You may contact the WCSD Volunteer Services Office at 775-851-5655, or email llightfoot@washoe.k12.nv.us with questions or for assistance.
Student / Volunteer relationships: Volunteers function in a position of trust and Washoe County School District does not extend that volunteer / student trust relationship outside of the supervised school environment. It is the responsibility of the volunteer to notify the site administrator immediately if he/she becomes involved with a student / family outside the WCSD environment.

They will also work with teachers to further develop and integrate current classroom curriculum in the garden. They are responsible for weekly emails and communication between the School Garden Committee members, the school and the community, Garden scheduling, event planning and the School Garden Committee meetings will also be the responsibility of these positions. Coordinators will represent the Garden Habitat at PTO meetings and other necessary community forums.

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## Teaching Teens Financial Responsibility

- Talk about the future-What will come after high school? If it's college, what portion of expenses will the teen have to cover? Older teens also begin to think about career choices. This is a good time to talk with them about saving for retirement. It's never too early to have that conversation.
