

Letter from the Principal

Dear Parents and Guardians:

As we begin the second quarter of the school year, I am pleased to say that it has been a good first quarter. Our **enrollment** on Count Day was 2050. Reed High School was built in 1974 for 1800 students which is a far cry from the 2700 students walking the halls of Reed High School over twelve years ago. Reed High School Faculty and Administration continue to provide a safe environment with high academic standards.

Reed High School did not make adequate Annual Yearly Progress under **No Child Left Behind** and was designated as a school In Need of Improvement in the area of IEP English Language Arts (ELA) and Math and in Hispanic/Latino in Math. Please know that Reed High School's School Improvement Plan will reflect changes to address these areas so that our students demonstrate Adequate Yearly Progress.

As a school, we exceeded the goal of 86.70% in ELA (English Language Arts) by scoring 90.85% and in the Math category; Reed HS scored 79.07% exceeding the goal of 71.30%. We still have work to do with Special Education (IEP) and Hispanic/Latino to reach Annual Yearly Progress. The subgroups of English Language Proficient (LEP) and Free and Reduced Lunch (FRL) made adequate yearly progress using Safe Harbor.

The **High School Proficiency Examination** (HSPE) is important in that it not only serves as the school's report card but the students must pass the Math, Reading, Writing, and Science portions of the HSPE to be eligible for a standard diploma.

The **HSPE test schedule** is:

November 1, Tuesday

MATH 11th & 12th grade students who have not yet passed the test.

November 2, Wednesday

WRITING for ALL 11th grade students and 12th grade students who have not yet passed. There will be a three hour delay on this day only for 9th grade, 10th grade, and any 11th and 12th grade student who already passed the test.

November 3, Thursday

READING for 11th & 12th grade students who have not yet passed the test.

November 4, Friday

SCIENCE for any 11^{th} and 12^{th} grade students who have not yet passed the test.

As you may have read in the newspaper or seen the press conference, the **graduation rate** in Washoe County Schools is going up. Reed High School raised its graduation rate by 14% in 2010 and the following year, 2011, another 3%.

I credit the Reed community with this tremendous increase from the teachers who instruct your children every day, to the counselors who review your child's credits and make recommendations for credit recovery and host College and Career nights, to the teachers who offer to teach the 7:00 a.m., 2:35 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Plato credit recovery classes, to those teachers who offer to teach Saturday morning HSPE Math Review and Saturday afternoon HSPE Science Review, to the Special Education teachers who held their student to high expectations, and to all of the students.

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with their parents' encouragement who attended the classes. Due to funding from WCSD, we again offer these classes currently and if you are interested, please contact your child's counselor.

The Board of Trustees developed Envision 2015, the school district's Pathway Performance Targets. The Pathway Performance Target for Reed HS graduation rate was 79% - we met our goal; the Pathway Performance Target for 9th Grade Credits of 5 or more was 93% - Reed High School obtained a 88%; the Pathway Performance Target for SAT Participation and Performance was 32% with a score of 1455 and Reed HS scored 32% participation as a composite score of 1488; the Pathway Performance Target for ACT Participation and Composite Score of 29% participation with a composite score of 20.9 and Reed HS scored 25.2% participation with a composite score of 21.4; the Pathway Performance Target for AP/IB Participation and Performance 25% participation and 44% scoring 3 or higher, Reed HS scored 25% in participation and 39% (185) of the 479 total tests taken scored a 3 or higher. The bar is raised higher each year so we must continue to achieve high standards and encourage more students to take the ACT, SAT, and Advanced Placement (AP) classes.

I am also pleased to report that we have approximately 508 students enrolled in thirteen different Advanced Placement courses. The advantages of enrolling in Advanced Placement courses not only offers the students college level courses on the high school level, but if the student receives a 3 or above on the AP test administered in May, the student may

be granted college credit or be exempt from taking lower level prerequisites. With the **rising cost** of college, this is a real advantage.

Assistant Principal (Senior Class) ~ Curriculum & Testing

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Class of 2012 - Seniors

Hello and **welcome back** to another fabulous year at Reed High School. It is hard to believe that we are already into the school year by more than a month. As you are probably aware, the roles of the administration at Reed were redefined for this year. Each of the four assistant principals is now assigned the responsibility for oversight of one of the four classes at Reed. I was lucky enough to get the senior class. That means that I will be

working with this group of kids to address any needs that they might have. We have many teachers who are also working with the "Senior Team" as well as two counselors, Bob White (last name A - Li) and Lynette Gardner (last name Lo - Z). Bob can be reached at 325-8319, Lynette at 325-8316, and my direct line is 325-8303. Please don't hesitate to contact us if there are any issues with your son or daughter that we can help with.

One of the things that we decided to do to improve communication is to open a **Twitter** feed that will text important information to students and parents about upcoming events at the school. You can get this information directly on your phone by texting **"Follow reedseniors"** to **40404.** This form of communication is one way so please don't hesitate to contact us if you have questions about any message you receive.

One of the ways that the senior team chose to improve services to our seniors was not real popular with the class itself. In the past, seniors who were in good standing were allowed to "opt-out" of the enrichment period allowing them to leave campus for thirty-five minutes every morning. The students loved this opportunity however we found out that they were missing important communications that were presented during that time as well as opportunities to prepare college and scholarship applications. Additionally, the all-important senior reviews which are conducted by our counselors were very difficult to conduct. As such, the decision was made to keep the seniors

on campus during this period. In addition to the previously mentioned benefits, I am also excited for the potential to bring guest speakers to Reed who can provide much needed **career** and **education planning** for our kids as they prepare to enter the adult world next year. Lastly, since the focus of this period had less to do with enriching and more to do with academics, we renamed the period **Academic Success** or **Ac-Cess** for short.

In an effort to reward seniors for achieving success in their

academics, the senior team designed the "Reed High Senior ALL Ac-Cess Pass". This is an orange card the size of a business card that seniors can earn for various reasons. They include, but are not limited to, academic excellence, excellent behavior, and positive citizenship. This card requires that the student have their name printed in ink as well as the signature of their parent, their Ac-Cess teacher, and the date that it is used. Each card will allow the student to leave campus for one Ac-Cess period. We

will be giving the first round of Ac-Cess passes to students beginning the first week in October at the academic letter awards ceremony.

This year on October 12th, many of the seniors will be given the opportunity to take the **Accuplacer** Test. This computer based exam is used by **UNR** and **TMCC** to place incoming students in math and language arts courses. This exam can be taken multiple times however there is a cost associated with subsequent exams. This opportunity will be provided free of charge to you and your family.

My other hat is that of **testing** administrator for Reed. The High School Proficiency Exams will be given to juniors and seniors who still need to pass them during the first week in November. Bullying has been recognized as one of the largest concerns in schools across the country. We have been diligently addressing this and will continue this year. Every student has the **right** to come to school and **feel safe**. Any acts involving bullying and harassment will not be tolerated on school grounds or off school grounds. WCSD School Police and Sparks Police Department have the right to charge you with a misdemeanor for any actions involving bullying and harassment that happens repeatedly over time. We have numerous resources that we would like to share with parents. There are several forms of bullying.

BULLYING:

A student is bullied when he or she is exposed, repeatedly and over time, to negative actions on the part of one or more persons that are intended to cause harm or serious emotional stress. The three types of bullying are **Verbal**, **Physical** and **Emotional**.

CYBER-BULLYING:

A student is bullied through the use of electronic communication. This is inappropriate communication by telephone, cell phone, text, websites like MySpace, Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, etc.

ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION:

A student is bullied by any written, verbal, or pictorial information through the use of a telephone, cell phone, or a computer.

HARRASSMENT:

A conduct that is highly offensive and intended to cause serious emotional distress in an individual.

INTIMIDATION:

A conduct that is highly offensive and poses a threat of immediate harm or actually harms another person of their property.

Please contact any of the administration if you have any questions or concerns.

I would like to remind all parents/guardians to please read through your student's handbook; therefore, familiarizing yourself and your student with the policies, procedures, and many exciting activities at Edward C. Reed High School.

Assemblies

Attendance at all assemblies is mandatory. Prior to leaving class for a school assembly, students must leave backpacks and all personal belongings in their locked classroom. If a student does not feel comfortable leaving their belongings in the locked classroom, they may leave their items in their assigned locker. If a student tries to enter the assembly with personal items, he/she will be re-directed to the Student Relations Office to check in their items, and then directed back to enjoy the assembly.

We expect our students to follow all **school rules**, and be a respectful, responsible, and courteous audience. Students who choose to display inappropriate behaviors, will immediately be removed and escorted to the Student Relations Office. Depending on the severity of their actions, the student may receive further consequences and be subject to removal from future assemblies.

(Additional Details See: RHS Student Handbook pp. 8 & 9) Regular attendance and compliance with Washoe County School District Attendance Policy are important to success at Reed High School.

- Students are required to attend 100% of all scheduled classes, unless otherwise excused.
- All parent notes must include the student's name and be signed by a parent/legal guardian.
- Parent notes or parent calls are required to excuse prearranged absences and obtain verification of those appointments with the school's attendance office.
- Absences for <u>extenuating circumstances</u> must be prearranged with the school's attendance office and be approved by an administrator. Failure to complete this process may result in the absence being classified as UNV (Unverified).
- Parents/guardians are encouraged to call the school's attendance office, prior to 9:00 a.m. if their student is home ill. This procedure will help the office know the whereabouts of students. The school will make telephone contact with a parent after the student's absence.
- The limitation of absences is six (6) domestic, unverified, or truant absences per semester. This is in accordance with the 90% rule for a block schedule school. On the student's seventh (7th) domestic, unverified, or truant absence, the student may lose credit in the class.
- "Circumstance" absences are limited to five/class/ semester. These absences do not count towards the 90% attendance rule.

OFF CAMPUS PASS

Students may obtain a street pass **before** school in the Attendance Office for the purpose of attending a medical, dental, or legal appointment. The student should have their street pass signed with the time of departure by the professional. The street pass is returned to the attendance office, where he/she will be issued a pass to class.

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TARDIES

Reed High School takes a very **serious approach** to addressing tardies. Student must learn that being punctual is important. We are asking that all parents / guardians fully **support** this policy and provide your child with examples of real-life situations and consequences. This will assist in reinforcing what they hear at school (their job) everyday from teachers and administrators. We appreciate your support!

Be Responsible, Be Respectful... Arrive To Class On Time!

(Additional Details See: RHS Student Handbook pp. 9 & 10)

- All students tardy to class will be written a pass by a staff member in their hall (main, yellow, blue, PE).
- The student will hand their teacher a tardy pass to be let into class late.
- All students who receive a tardy pass will automatically be administered a 15 minute lunch or after-school detention to be served on the day received.

- If the student is tardy, prior to lunch he/she will serve lunch detention in the small gym. If the student is tardy, after lunch break, he/she will serve afterschool detention in the cafeteria. All detentions begin within 2 minutes after the bell.
- If the assigned detention is missed, the student will receive additional consequences by the Dean of Students or their grade level Assistant Principal. Do Not Miss Your Detention!!!
- We will only excuse tardies that can be verified by documentation from a professional office or person (i.e. Doctor, appointment card from the court, police officer's business card, etc.).
- We <u>do not accept</u> hand written notes for tardiness from anyone.
- A parent can escort a student into the building to meet with the attendance clerk to excuse a tardy. However, that person must verify their identity and the student's attendance record will be checked for excessive tardiness.

Welcome back **Raider Nation!** After a long summer layoff, Reed Athletics is back in full swing with our Fall Sports Season. However, before we begin with Fall there is one momentous achievement from over the Summer that we need to mention. **Gabrielle Williams** (Gabby) was named the **Gatorade** Nevada Track Athlete of the Year for the 2010-11 school year. Congratulations Gabby!

Full swing might be a bit of an understatement considering how much our Raider Student Athletes have dominated the competition this season. At the time of this writing Reed is set for one of its most if not the most successful Fall season in memory. All of our Fall Sports are currently qualified or in line to qualify for the **Fall Regionals**.

Let's start on the **Tennis** courts where both the boys and girls have qualified for Regional play. On the boys side Reed qualified as the #4 seed in a very tough High Desert League. The boys win over rival Spanish Springs helped them clinch a second consecutive postseason berth where they will face the #1 seed out of the Sierra League (still to be determined at the time of this writing). On the girls side, Reed clinched a post-season berth with an exciting 10-9 win over Spanish Springs. For the girls, this marks a long awaited return to the post-season. They will face the #1 seeded Galena Grizzlies when the Regionals begin.

In **Soccer**, both our boys and girls are fielding younger than usual teams, but that has not stopped them from filling the nets. Our **girls** are currently in the thick of the playoff race and just a couple of points out of the top spot in the

High Desert League. For our boys it has been an exciting and well fought season. As of this writing they are currently holding the #4 spot with a firm grip and they will have plenty of opportunities to move up as the season winds down. We expect to see both the boys and girls vying for Regional crowns when their post-season begins in late October at Damonte Ranch High School.

We in the Athletic Department would be remiss without mentioning the outstanding career Senior **Dylan Valentine** has put together. Dylan is on the cusp of breaking the school mark for goals in a career. He currently has netted 55 career **soccer** goals and with just under half the season remaining, he appears to be a lock for breaking that mark (58).

On the Volleyball court, Reed is coming off one of its biggest wins in program history. Reed defeated perennial Region and State power Manogue on the Miners home court in five games. The Lady Raiders unfazed by a slow start rallied back to shock the Miners in the fifth and final game. Reed is currently battling for the top spot in the High Desert League and looks forward to rematches with Spanish Springs and Reno in the second half of the season. Look for these girls to make some serious noise at the Regional playoffs.

On the running trails of Northern Nevada the Boys and Girls **Cross Country** team has been flying. On the **boys** side, we have consistently placed in the top 4 as a team. On the **girls** side, they are coming off a phenomenal performance where they netted some hardware with a second place overall finish in their last meet. Our outstanding young teams will be a major threat

to the established powers at the upcoming Regionals set for October 28th at Rancho San Rafael.

The Lady Raiders golf team is having another solid year. The girls have been fighting all year to keep pace with perennial powers and rivals on the High Desert League side. This young team has more than held their own and is set to pull some upsets when Regionals begin in October.

The missing participation points need to be made up. The only exception will be Doctors' notes excusing students from participating in physical education class (assignments may be assigned but may not to exceed the district mandatory requirement of participation days). EX: IF A MATH CLASS IS MISSED, THE WORK NEEDS TO BE MADE UP.

Enrichment Make-Ups:

Students may obtain a pass from their teacher prior to enrichment class. The students will **not** be required to dress out for this opportunity. The track is utilized during nice weather, while the main gym will be used for inclement weather.


