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Letter from the Principal

Dear Parents and Guardians:

As we begin the second quarter of the school year, I am pleased to say that it has been a good first quarter. Our enrollment on Count Day was 1992.

Graduation for the Class of 2015 has been scheduled for Monday, June 15, at 2:00 p.m. at Lawlor Events Center. Graduation Practice is scheduled from 12:00-1:30 p.m. Doors open ½ hour earlier for both Graduation Practice and Graduation.

Our most recent WCSD and State of Nevada Report Cards gave us three (3) STARS. We earned 66.50 points for a Three-Star school which is 1.5 points below a Four-Star school. To increase our status, Reed HS must become more proficient in first time 10th grade test takers in passing the HSPE as well as 11th grade success. We also need to work on the reduction in the achievement gap between the subgroup proficiency rate and the statewide proficiency rate for all students in that subgroup. Reed HS also lost points due to the % of Advanced Placement Proficient/College Credit, % of ACT/SAT Participation and % of students Earning Advanced Diplomas.

Our counselors will encourage students in the future to seek Advanced and Honors diplomas:

- An ADVANCED DIPLOMA requires a cumulative GPA of 3.25 (weighted or unweighted) 24 credits, 4 math credits, and 3 science credits.
- An HONORS DIPLOMA requires a cumulative GPA of 3.40 (weighted or unweighted), 24 credits, 4 Math credits, 3 Science credits,

8 Honors/AP Credits, 2 credits of the same language, no course failures during the junior or senior year.

I am also pleased to report that we have approximately 1205 students enrolled in twenty-one, up from seventeen last year, different **Advanced Placement** courses - that is an increase of 300 students from last year. The advantages of enrolling in Advanced Placement courses not only offers the students college level courses on the high school level, but if the student receives a 3 or above on the AP test administered in May, the student may be granted college credit or be exempt from taking lower level prerequisites. With the rising cost of college, this is a real advantage.

Reed's Advanced Placement teachers this year are: Mark Bridgewater - AP Biology, Deseree Courneya – AP Micro/Macro Economics, Lauren Geldert - AP Psychology, Raymond Hirschman -AP English Literature, Caroline Hirvela - AP Statistics, Richard Hoadley - AP English Language, David Hooker - AP Physics, Kellie Kareck - AP Calculus BC, Balbine Mengu - AP Spanish Literature, Catherine Morgan - AP US History, Dean Pereos - AP Physics, O'Neill - AP Geography, Steve Pittenger – AP Art History, Tim Powers - AP Biology, Ilana Rugg - AP French Language, Johanna Riley - AP World History, Janet Sawyer - AP Chemistry, Ryan Smith - AP Spanish Language, Mark Towell - AP Government - We The People, and Shelly Williamson -AP Government.

ATTENDANCE

The Washoe County School District attendance policy states that all students are required to attend school for a minimum of 90% of the scheduled classes in order to receive credit. The emphasis of the attendance policy is on the importance of keeping students in school and providing access to the curriculum.

Fortunately, not all absences count against the 90%. For example, if your child misses school for a medical reason (MED), or doctor excused (EMD), school business (SCH), or a circumstance (CIR), those days are not counted against the 90%. Therefore, at Reed High School, 90% attendance translates to no more than nine (9) unverified absences per semester.

Absence types that do count against the 90% attendance rule are absent unknown (AUK), domestic (DOM), truant (CT) and a new code, parent note/call after 3 days (NCU). If your child does miss school, please make sure you send a note or make a phone call into the attendance

ATTENDANCE APPEALS

Students with ten (10) or more unexcused absences can submit an appeal if they are passing the class(es) in which they have exceeded the 90% attendance requirement. Please see Mrs. Coffman for the appeal contract.

TARDIES

Punctuality makes for fewer interruptions to learning and is one of the traits employers value most. We work diligently to reward punctuality and discourage tardiness at Reed High School.

There are many students who are rarely or never late. These students can look forward to receiving H.O.T. Passes (as long as they don't have unexcused absences), which can be used to get out of a detention or turned in at the end of the year for a chance at raffle prizes. There are those few, however, who are frequently or chronically tardy to school and class, which is disruptive to the teaching and learning environment already taking place.

Reed High School has implemented **Social Emotional Learning** (SEL) into our Freshman Seminar classes for the 2014-2015 school year. Research shows that SEL is important to students' success in school and beyond. SEL is the process by which we develop the ability to recognize and manage emotions, form positive relationships with others, solve problems, motivate ourselves to accomplish goals, make responsible decisions, and avoid risky behaviors. There is evidence linking SEL skills training with improved academic outcomes and reduced anti-social behavior (DiPerna & Elliot, 1999; Feshbach & Feshbach, 1987; Haynes, Ben-Avie, & Ensign, 2003; Hawkins, Farrington, & Catalano, 1998).

On another note we continue to work with the WCSD school board in establishing permanent guidelines based on school board policy 5105 concerning the **uniform policy**. At this point students must wear a uniform polo in black, blue, yellow or white, along with solid black or khaki pants. Students may wear jackets, sweatshirts, or any other warm clothing of their choice over their school uniforms, as long as it is appropriate for the school setting.

If you are looking for literature to help promote success with your students please consider reading the book *Mindset:* the new psychology of success (Dweck, 2006). Carol S. Dweck Ph.D. explains that our abilities and talents are not what make us successful. It is how we approach situations by using either a growth mindset or a fixed mindset. The book contains great advice about how to praise and reassure your students to get them to achieve at the highest level. It is a research based book, but well written and easy to read.

Thank you for the warm welcome to Reed High School. I will continue to build relationships and help motivate students to be *Responsible*, *Respectful*, and *Successful*!

Did you know Washoe County School District's Gifted and **Talented Education** (GATE) Program sponsors an off-campus internship program for eligible juniors and seniors? Each semester a select group of students are chosen to shadow professionals in their fields of work for 60 hours, earning the student not only a half-credit but also a great experience to list on their resumes or college applications. This semester, our gifted students are shadowing doctors, dentists, veterinarians, IT directors, marketing and advertising professionals, fire chiefs, educators, air traffic controllers, and a dozen other professionals in the field. To be eligible, students must have a 3.25 un-weighted GPA, and they must be currently enrolled in AP or IB courses, or be certified as a Gifted student. The GATE internship opportunity is intended to allow them to explore a career option before they commit to a course of study at any university.

Applications for the upcoming spring semester are due to a student's counselor by December 3, 2014. Applications can be sent to you by the Internship Coordinator (see below) or a student's counselor. Late applications are never accepted. Applications for next fall's semester will be due in mid-May of 2015, but they can certainly be turned in earlier to either a counselor or to Reed's amazing Career Center Coordinator, Becky Smith, in the Reed library. In order to give students more options after graduation from high school, everyone is automatically enrolled in the **Gateway Curriculum**:

- 4 years of math
- 3 years of science
- 7 classes as a senior

The **Honors Program** is designed to enhance academic preparation and challenge students through more rigorous course work. An honors course offers material that is intellectually stimulating and challenges students beyond the scope of regular classroom work; assumes a mastery of the basics

required for further study in a given area; emphasizes the quality of work over the quantity of work; provides depth and divergence through the study of ideas, themes, and problems; integrates knowledge across disciplines; demands use of higher order thinking skill including abstract reasoning, analysis, synthesis, and evaluation; requires use of higher order thinking skills including abstract reasoning, analysis, synthesis, and evaluation; requires flexibility in thinking and the use of divergent viewpoints; requires a proven student work ethic and full engagement in learning as an experience in its own right; requires excellence in the use of oral, written, and research skills; and promotes the use of a variety of in-depth performance tasks and assessment tools.


In ROTC class cadets are hard at work marching, training to be physically fit, and studying important leadership traits. They are also learning general knowledge about the military and its history.

Endorsements/Certificates for Signature Academy Students

Students can earn a Nevada Certificate of Skills Attainment and a state-issued CTE (Career & Technical Education) Diploma Endorsement by satisfying the requirements for graduation from high school and successfully completing the approved sequence of courses leading to a completion (level three) course in a CTE program. Upon completion of level three courses, students are required to take two Completion Exams: a Technical Skills exam and an Employability skills (workplace readiness) exam.

To earn the certificate/endorsement, students must:

- Maintain at least a 3.0 GPA in the CTE course sequence;
- 2) Pass the assessment that measures proficiency in employability skills; and
- 3) Pass the end-of-program technical assessment

Students who complete an approved WCSD Signature Academy program of study will also be eligible for a Signature Academy Certificate of Completion, which will be awarded by the WCSD Signature Academy & CTE Department.

The Basics on Grants and Scholarships

(Information by The College Board)

Financial aid is money lent or given to you to help you pay for college. Grants and scholarships are kinds of financial aid that you don't have to pay back. That's why they're called gift aid.

All kinds of students get gift aid. Most grants are awarded based on financial need. But a good portion of gift aid is awarded for academic achievement.

If you're thinking about going to college, you should definitely apply for grants and scholarships. Remember, though, that gift aid rarely covers the entire cost of college. It's just part of the picture — a picture that may include loans, family savings and other sources of money.

Grants and Scholarships Defined

The terms "scholarship" and "grant" are often used interchangeably, but there are usually differences between these two forms of aid.

Most scholarships are merit based. This means that they are awarded to students with certain qualities, such as proven academic or athletic ability. Many scholarships have rules — maintaining a certain GPA, for example — that you have to follow to continue receiving aid.

Most grants are need based. This means that they are usually awarded based on your or your family's financial situation.

Sources of Grants and Scholarships

Both grants and scholarships come from the following sources.

Governments

Federal and state governments are sources of gift aid.

- The federal government is the largest source of need-based gift aid, primarily in the form of the Pell Grant.
- State governments often fund grants and scholarships for residents attending college in their state.

Colleges

Many colleges offer grants and scholarships to their students.

- These may be merit based or need based, or a combination of the two.
- Colleges may have stricter requirements for keeping a scholarship than do other sources of scholarships.

Private Organizations

Many companies, foundations, community organizations and clubs sponsor grants or scholarships. Grants and scholarships from these private organizations are called outside, or private, scholarships.

Here are some examples of possible sources of outside scholarships:

- Your parents' employers or labor unions
- Your family's religious center
- Organizations such as the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), 4-H and the Boy Scouts of America

Three Steps to Tap into Grants and Scholarships


To apply for grants and scholarships, you'll most likely have to fill out financial aid forms such as the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Outside scholarships usually have their own application forms and application processes.

1. Complete the FAFSA

You must fill out the FAFSA to qualify for federal aid. Many states and colleges use the FAFSA to award aid as well.

2. Find Out What Financial Aid Forms Your College Requires

Apply for your college's gift aid by filling out the required forms. In many cases, this will be the FAFSA, but some colleges require their



3. Research and Apply for Outside Scholarships

Start by talking with your school counselor about how to find outside scholarships. Use free online searches, such as the College Board's Scholarship Search, Scholarships.com, or Fastweb.com. To apply for an outside scholarship, you'll probably have to fill out an application form, and you may also have to submit financial aid forms.

Scholarships Start Here

Scholarships are awarded based on achievement, need or both. Many scholarships have other requirements — for example, they may only be offered to students who live in a certain state, are interested in a certain major or have a disability.



How to Apply for a Scholarship

Applying for scholarships is a lot like applying to colleges. You start with a large number of possibilities and cut that down to a short list of choices. Then you have to complete and submit applications that include essays, recommendations and lists of achievements that highlight your best qualities.

You may hear various suggestions about the best way to apply for scholarships. The truth is, what works for one person may not work for another. There are no secrets to applying. The best advice is to use common sense and follow directions.

Don't Miss Deadlines


Some scholarships have deadlines early in the fall of senior year. Mark the due dates on your calendar and work your way backward to figure out how much time you'll have to get each piece of the application finished.

Start Your Research Early

Researching scholarships, requesting information and application materials, and completing applications all take time.

Read Eligibility Requirements Carefully

If you have a question about whether you qualify for a certain scholarship, contact the scholarship sponsor. There's no point in applying for a scholarship you're not eligible to receive.

Get Organized

Make a separate file for each scholarship and sort the files by application due dates.

You should also gather the items you'll need to apply. Many scholarships ask you to send some or all of the following:

- High school transcript
- Standardized test scores
- Financial aid forms, such as the FAFSA
- Parents' financial information, including tax returns
- One or more essays
- One or more letters of recommendation
- Proof of eligibility for the scholarship (for example, proof of membership in a certain group)

You might also need to prepare for an interview. And if you're competing for talent-based scholarships, you'll probably need to audition or submit a portfolio.

Follow Instructions

Stick to the word limit for the essay. If supporting materials are not requested in the application, don't send them.

Check Your Application

Before you send the application in:


- Make sure you filled in all the blanks. You can contact scholarship sponsors if you aren't sure how to fill out part of the application.
- Make sure your answers are readable. If you can, fill out the application online. If you have to write out the application, print neatly.
- If you're reusing material (such as a cover letter or an essay) from another scholarship application, make sure you haven't left in any incorrect names.
- Proofread your application. Run spell check and grammar check on the application. Also, have someone else read your essays to catch mistakes and give you feedback.
- Remember to sign and date your application.

Keep Copies of Everything

Having copies of your scholarship application makes it easy to resend quickly if application materials get lost in the mail. If you're applying for a scholarship online, save copies of your work on your computer.

Track the Package

If you're submitting your application by mail, consider using certified mail or requesting a return receipt to confirm that your materials arrived at their destination.

Where to Find College Scholarships

The government, colleges and private organizations provide money to help students cover college costs. This financial aid comes in several forms. One form is scholarships — gifts of money that does not need to be paid back.

Scholarships are usually offered to students who meet certain requirements. For example, scholarships may be given to students who have strong academic or athletic skills, who are members of a specific ethnic group or whose parents work for a certain company. Here are more details about what types of scholarships are available and where to find them.

College Scholarships

Scholarships given by colleges are the most common type of scholarships. Check out a college's website, catalog and financial aid materials for information on the scholarships it offers. Awards can be offered on a university-wide basis or within a particular college or major.

Your college may automatically put your name in for its scholarships when you submit financial aid forms. Ask a financial aid officer if this is the case.

Outside Scholarships

Outside scholarships — those given by an organization that isn't your college or the federal government — will most likely be a small part of your college money but can help meet costs. Here are some places you can look for these types of awards.

Local Scholarships


Ask your school counselor or principal about awards for students graduating from your high school and for residents of your town, county and state. Look online and in your public library for information on local scholarships as well.

You may find scholarships sponsored by

- Your church, mosque, synagogue or other religious community
- Local branches of organizations such as the Rotary Club or the Kiwanis
- Your parents' employers
- Your employer

State Scholarships

Almost every state has a scholarship program for residents, and the awards are usually limited to students who will attend college in that same state. For example, the State of Nevada offers the Governor Guinn Millennium Scholarship to qualified Nevadans



Featured Fact: Warning Please Be Aware Of Scholarship Scams!

There are many people out there trying to take advantage of students and parents looking for scholarships. There are several things that might alert you to a problem.

- 1) The people you are dealing with are guaranteeing that you will get a scholarship. Unless they are the ones giving the scholarship, they can't guarantee anything.
- 2) They are asking you for money. People giving out scholarships are in the business of giving money away. They shouldn't be asking you for it.
- 3) They ask you for your credit card or bank information. There is no reason a legitimate organization would need this information.
- 4) You're told you won a scholarship that you never applied for, and are then asked for personal information. Sorry, no one is going to win anything they haven't applied for.
- 5) They won't answer your questions. A legitimate organization should be upfront about whatever you want to know.

If you feel that an organization is not being upfront with you, please don't deal with them. Keep track of any information you have about the organization and then contact the Federal Trade Commission, the Better Business Bureau, or the local authorities for help.

Search for a Scholarship

To find more scholarships, you can use free services like the College Board's Scholarship Search, Scholarships.com, or Fastweb.com. You should never have to pay for scholarship information.

Scholarship Search collects information on thousands of awards. It matches the details you submit with scholarship guidelines and then presents you with a list of possibilities to choose from. Once you've narrowed down the list to the scholarships that fit you best, learn how to apply.

What is a Pell Grant?

Federal Program Offers a Source of Financing for Students

Approximately two-thirds of full-time college students receive some kind of financial aid. Some receive Federal Pell Grants. A Pell Grant is money the government provides for students who need it to pay for college. Grants, unlike loans, do not have to be repaid. Eligible students receive a specified amount each year under this program.


Eligibility

The U.S. Department of Education uses a standard formula to evaluate the information you supply when applying for a Pell Grant. This formula produces a number called the Expected Family Contribution (EFC), which determines if you are eligible. The grant requires that you:

- Are an undergraduate student who has not earned a bachelor's degree
- Are a U.S. citizen or an eligible noncitizen
- Have a high school diploma or a GED

Award Amount

The amount of the grant depends on your EFC and several factors, including your cost of attendance (tuition and fees, room and board, books, and supplies) and the amount of time you attend college (whether a full academic year or less, and

Featured Fact: Official Transcripts

Throughout the college and scholarship application process you will be asked to submit official transcripts. Transcripts can now be sent electronically through a program called Parchment through http://exchange.parchment.com/. Visit the website then click on "Students" near the upper right-hand corner. Complete the required registration steps listed. Be sure to select the options that apply to you. whether you attend full-time or part-time). You cannot receive Pell Grant funds from more than one college at a time.

Disbursement

A college may credit Pell Grant funds to your account, pay you directly or use a combination of these two methods. The college must notify you in writing of the amount of the Pell Grant, and of how and when payments are made. Colleges must pay at least once per term, whether that is a semester, trimester or quarter. Colleges that don't use formally defined traditional terms must pay the student at least twice per academic year.

How and When to Apply

You apply for Pell Grants, as well all federal, state and some institutional financial aid programs, by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. You can request a paper FAFSA from the Federal Student Aid Information Center (FSAIC) at 800-4-FED-AID (433-3243). Check with your chosen college to find out its preferred filing deadline for the FAFSA.

How Outside Scholarships Affect Your Financial Aid Package

Getting an outside, or private, scholarship can actually reduce the amount of financial aid you get from your college. But that doesn't mean you'll have to pay a bigger share of your college costs. It just means that the scholarship dollars replace financialaid-package dollars.

What's an Outside Scholarship?


An outside scholarship is a scholarship awarded by an organization other than the government or your college — scholarships sponsored by your parent's employer or a community organization, for example.

If all the aid you receive ends up being \$300 or more above what you need, your college must reduce the aid it offers you.

Outside Scholarship and College Financial Aid

If all the aid you receive — outside scholarships, financial aid from your college, and government grants and loans — ends up being \$300 or more above your calculated need, the federal government requires your college to reduce the amount of needbased financial aid it awards you.

If you don't report your outside scholarship awards to your college's financial aid office, you might receive what's called an "overaward" — and you'll have to pay back that money.

Colleges Decide What to Cut

It's up to your college to decide what type of financial aid to reduce or cut if you receive an outside scholarship. Some cut down the college's grant. Others may reduce the amount of your loan. That's to your benefit — it means replacing loan dollars, which you must pay back, with scholarship dollars that you don't pay back. Other colleges may apply your scholarship award toward the next semester.

If you win an outside scholarship, tell your college's financial aid officers about it and ask them about your college's policy on outside scholarships.

How to Spot Scholarship Scams

Students seek aid. Scammers seek targets.

Scholarships are an attractive way to help pay for college. Students and parents want to find them. Unfortunately, that leads some people to pay for services that are nothing more than scams. Be on the lookout for lines scammers use...

"The scholarship is guaranteed or your money back"
No one can guarantee that they'll get you a grant or a scholarship. Refund guarantees often have conditions or strings attached. And you should never have to pay for scholarship information.

"I need your credit card or bank account number"
Some agencies claim that they need your credit card or bank account number to "hold the scholarship." Never give out this information.

"We'll do all the work"

Although the offer is tempting — especially during a busy time like senior year — don't be fooled. There's no way around it. You must apply for scholarships or grants yourself.


"The scholarship will cost money"

Applying for a scholarship generally does not cost money. Only a few legitimate scholarships ask for a small application fee. If a scholarship requires a fee, do some research to make sure it's not a scam.

"Millions of dollars in scholarships go unclaimed every year"
Few scholarships go unclaimed. The fact is, nearly all available financial aid comes from the federal government or from colleges.
